

They have decided to run the event at this time to reduce costs, and to bookend the event with other events being run in Adelaide at this time.

But of course, before the 2026 event we have the National Meeting in Albury over Easter next year. So put it in your calendar. If you haven't been to a Natmeet before, they are great fun and a wonderful opportunity for you to get your MG out and participate in social and sporting events with other MG enthusiasts from around the country. 
Colin will bring the Gilbern G.T. 1800 to club events having nearly completed its restoration.

Thank you Colin, for an entertaining and interesting evening.






11th June Members Gathering.

The National Meeting Tamworth 2024 . Kimber Run

Sunday 31st March 2024 from Tamworth to Nundle Having been tasked with writing up the report on the Kimber Run at the National Meeting, I thought I should do some research on what a Kimber Run report contains. A quick Google brought up a good number from a range of countries: UK, South Africa and plenty from Australia. But none from the USA. Surprising the topics covered in the reports did not vary, they all seemed to follow the same tried and tested format:

- Number of vehicles Number of people
- Coffee •Route Weather Lunch Scenery

So, this being my first attempt at a Kimber Report and being a relatively new member, I don't think its my position to rock the proverbial boat. I'll follow the tried and tested format for fear of causing offence otherwise.

Following the previous couple of days the Easter Sunday weather was glorious. Perfect for a drive in the country in an MG. A coolish morning warming through the day, but not a cloud in the bright blue sky. Clearly there was no excuse to sleep in and the 75 cars and presumably around 150 participants that had registered for the run turned up promptly at the Mercure Hotel car park to sign on, get a coffee from the mobile van, chat with the other drivers and navigators and wait for the Briefing.

Like all the other organisation for the National Meeting, Matt & Margaret Crawford seemed to have this nailed. The briefing started at the appointed hour where we were given a brief overview of the route, some warnings on road conditions, need to obey the rules of the road, speed limits and the lunch options in Nundle.

At 9.30 the first cars were waved off, led by a bunch of TC's who I guess jumped at this opportunity so that they could regulate the speed of the group.

It did not take me long to realise I had a problem. I had not even reached the starting line. The first instruction was zero the odometer. Not a problem, its just that mine does not move off this point since it was rebuilt during COVID. With some foresight its something I probably should have thought of before the day.

Anyway, with keen eyesight and astute guesses we managed to make our way through the early stages until the cars started to bunch up and it became a matter of following the car in the front, and checking the street names as we passed the corners.

A few minutes and we were through suburban Tamworth and on to a picturesque tree lined Calala Lane towards Piallamore and Dungowan following the Peel River up to the Chaffey Dam Lookout and then the quaintly named

Bowling Alley Point.

The dam was completed in 1979 when it was opened by local MP and Country Party stalwart Ian Sinclair. Not to be out done by his predecessor, Barnaby Joyce organised for the dam wall to be further raised for "safety reasons" and as a legacy (I'm making this bit up). The dam was needed to provide water for Tamworth and irrigation in the valley. This purpose seemed to have been achieved with the

amount of hay being grown and sold along our drive through the valley. From all the Lookout signage we further learned that the dam wall was constructed of a cryptocrystalline quartz called jasper and had an egg shaped, funnel like "Morning Glory" spillway, the largest in Australia. The dam also seemed to provide a popular camping spot and waterski park for the locals.











Following more photos of the cars overlooking the dam at Bowling Alley Point, it was a short run on to Nundle where the majority of cars stopped in search of the lunch options. A few of us pointed our cars up the steep, 600m climb and short, rough track to Hanging Rock Lookout in the "Hills of Gold".

I must admit I was unaware that this area was noteworthy for a couple of reasons:



firstly a gold rush in the 1850s when thousands of miners descended on the area and secondly it was home to Ashton's circus and sadly the burial place of its founder James's young wife who died in child birth.

Back to Nundle for lunch and hoping that the brakes did not overheat on the descent. By the time we arrived the MG contingent had been joined by a bunch of motor bikes, 4 wheel drives and assorted other travellers. The place was heaving and the locals were struggling to get food to the hungry. We were in a pretty little town, there was lots of the contingent to chat to and good food.

The Nundle Wollen Mill was the other point of interest for many. A tour of the historic machinery and demonstration of how wool was transformed from a sheep's back to a pair of socks fascinated the drivers and navigators. Plus the incentive to spend money in their shop was not missed. The mill tour ended with many thanks from the owners on behalf of the town for the MG crowd dropping a lot of money in town and saving them all from penury.

I think we were the last to leave Nundle to head home, so not sure which option everyone followed: retrace the route out or follow the Lindsay's Gap Road back to the New England Highway and into Tamworth. We followed the latter route and were rewarded by the scenery. Rolling hills studded with craggy gums with sheep and cattle grazing in the deep grassy paddocks. Serene.

A very pleasant day's drive in the country, where I am sure we all learned something new. When we arrived back in Tamworth the navigator was still smiling, so what more could we ask for.

Thanks Matt & Margaret for your organisation, and all the other volunteers for making the Run such an enjoyable day.

Tamworth National Meeting Motorkhana

PART A - The Event Planning Phase

Sunday 31st March 2024 – Gunnedah Regional Airport, Gunnedah NSW.

The Motorkhana Sporting Event is a relatively simple in concept NON Speed Event which does NOT require a Motorsport Australia Speed Licence. The following provides the many planning & approval items and a few hurdles we needed to overcome to make this event happen, as all that most people were aware of course was the day of competition, (as probably also occurred for all the main Natmeet Social & Non Social Events I suspect).

The Competition held on the day follows in Part B. The choice of the Gunnedah airstrip was made following a fruitless search by MG Natmeet Committee members for a suitable Motorkhana venue in Tamworth, and after I was told this Gunnedah venue was regularly used by the Tamworth Drag Association for their speed events. I was put in touch with a Geoff Hood from the Gunnedah Motoring Enthusiasts (GME), who explained his club had senior Motorsport Australia Officials, and held their own local speed events including a renowned fast Hillclimb at Mt Porcupine each year. Geoff explained the airstrip was the only current airstrip in 'Straya that had a Motorsport Australia (MA) Track Licence, meaning MA officials visited each year and inspected the airstrip for speed event suitability. This is what then unfolded for our relatively simple non speed event "The Thick Plottens" (Lev Grossman).

Geoff Hood from GME provided invaluable event planning assistance with his local knowledge and many years of experience in dealing with the Gunnedah Regional Council members, as this Council operates & maintains the Airport, and has the power to be able to close the airport for a day for motorsport. So we needed a booking. To get a booking we needed approvals. To get approvals we needed lots of paperwork.



So our Club took on the first time challenge for myself and this recently re-laid airstrip, of designing a set of Motorkhana Tests from the MA book of tests suitable for a narrow airstrip, and a helicopter pad, to include a good flow path for competing cars, approved locations/ places for spectators, and the setting up of a venue to suit a National Meeting event probably not tried before. This involved additional work in providing a design layout drawing and a detailed document of explanation to Gunnedah Council of what and how a Motorkhana is run under an MA Permit (and all the submission paperwork that MA requires). Gunnedah Council required this additional detailed information for their insurer & themselves, as both parties had not been involved with a Motorkhana event before, which was a bit of a concern, (and so was the new airstrip surface) but Council approval for airport Hire was finally forthcoming, including its dormant & mothballed Terminal Building (further details in Part B).

Additional Motorkhana planning was then required for the rather unusual possibility of a forced aircraft Emergency landing in the middle of our event, with cars and people needing to be evacuated from the intended airstrip landing! There was also an outside chance of Fire Fighting aircraft needing to refuel, if there was a local bushfire! (In fact there was a small fire in the hills near Gunnedah on the day of our event, but alternative refuelling was arranged). Šo I wrote up my first ever set of draft instructions for an evacuation procedure due to a forced landing on an airstrip being used for a Motorkhana, based on the required initial actions of a CASA trained Radio Operator legally permitted to communicate with airborne aircraft, whom we had engaged from Tamworth (he is also used for Drag Meetings). I purchased a little but loud compressed air horn to sound an emergency to all, and we arranged two sets of radios - one for an emergency landing, and the others for the event operation.



What we had NOT envisaged was another type of "emergency" – an aircraft requiring to take off during our event, in spite of a total closure notice issued by Council for this airstrip! This actually happened on the day when a small Cessna aircraft needed to refuel & take off, having landed at Gunnedah the previous day, with its pilot guilty of NOT reading his notes, and it was all handled very well indeed by our Clerk of Course (See Report Part B)

A couple of planning meetings were then held with Geoff Hood & GME officials on site, as they also planned to hold their own Half Mile Sprint event on the same airstrip, following completion of the Natmeet Motorkhana. This meant some additional planning & imposed some new time constraints on our Motorkhana, meaning that it was imperative to get permission from Council for us to attend the day before, to be able to measure & mark up all the Test pattern witches hat positions for three Tests in chalk (using some beaut chalk spray cans purchased by Max Wasson) & using volunteer teams from NSW, South Australia and Victoria, to save at least 1 and a half to two hours set up time for the next day. This Council approval took quite some time & several reminders to occur and there was a nervous





waiting period until Council permission was granted! Our Club had invaluable assistance from MGCC Victoria in firstly, Michael Herlihy (a Clerk Of Course) who helped me submit a Targeted Řísk Assessment to MA. He then successfully negotiate a change in a Motorsport Australia Competitor rule that required a minimum of a 3 point harness belt for all open cars in the speed event Lap Dash (as about half the expected entrants would have open cars, and thus probably would not Register for the Natmeet!). Marg and Ric Collett supplied & transported the 3 sets of Motorkhana Electronic Timing equipment up from Victoria, and also sought 2 additional volunteers apart from Marg to operate this equipment. There was stationary & printer items as well, and others to assist with starting and recording, apart from a few volunteers I had received. This small event took a small army of 24 Officials & Volunteers! Well done Marg & Ric.

To top this off, the food Vendor Charlie Frew had booked long ago, decided to cancel less than a month beforehand due to a lack of available staff. Hilary And I then scrambled to get replacements and then the next two replacement Vendors also cancelled when staff could be secured for an Easter Sunday! With about two weeks to go we still did not have a Vendor, (and still had NOT received our MA Permit either!) A local Vendor "Scope Empire Catering" was asked, but explained their food van was already booked. Later Alison from Scope Empire came back to me and said she had thought about our predicament and she had a possible solution – she could supply a tent, folding tables, a refrigerated trailer and two people to serve hot and cold food!

We were saved! The alternative would have been possibly a few sausage rolls and pies & take-a-way coffees to share from the limited stock available from a local garage on an Easter Sunday!

Motor Sport Australia then came up and issued the mandatory permit & the included Insurance cover, so we were finally set.

Now I just needed to finish off the time consuming entry processing and corrections emails of many very poorly submitted Entry Forms, and also grid order for the two competition Groups.

All this grinding final detail (from early concept work the previous year) to completion took the best part of three final months, and really required the work of two people to save some sanity and have some private life.

Tamworth National Meeting Lapdash

The Lapdash Sporting Event is a Speed Event requiring a Motorsport Australia Speed Licence, and was held at Oakburn Park Tamworth on Easter Monday. This was the same venue which was used by MG Sydney for their 2008 MG National Meeting, with support from the Tamworth Sporting Car Club.



Competitors were offered track time in two groups: Class N MGB Rubber bumper to Class ZZ having a morning start and Class A Pre-war to Class M MGB BL after lunch. Each competitor completed 3 consecutive laps of the very tight 700m Oakburn track with timing by electronic beam at the Start/Finish line. The aggregate (or combined) time for the 3 laps was recorded for Club points, for the first two rounds. Some competitors took the opportunity to complete a third unrecorded round.

We were very fortunate with a clear sunny day for the event and despite an unfortunate "off" by Robert Wilson (MGA59) at the practice day on the previous Thursday,



the event on the 1st April went off very smoothly thanks to the great organisation by Event Secretary, Steve Perry (MGCC Sydney), Event Director Michael Herlihy (MGCC Victoria), Chief Scrutineer Tim Edmonds (MGCC SA) & his team of volunteer scrutineers, Max Wasson & Stuart Ratcliff with the MG Sporting "Props" Support Truck, and valuable members of the Tamworth Sporting Car Club (TSCC), who regularly hold speed events at this raceway. 

Touring the Great Ocean Road

Day 1 Wed 1st May. Sydney to Cootamundra 332K

Cars assembled on Wednesday morning at the Pheasants Nest Ampol Road House for our nine day Don Young Tour of the Great Ocean Road and Grampians. Early arrival Dominic David established an unofficial "Dummy Grid" area in the car park. The rain that accompanied our drive out of Sydney had left us by the time we arrived, presenting a fine sunny autumn morning. This only added to expectations ahead, as route directions were distributed and briefing given to the 13 participants.

More were expected to join us during the day. Nine cars (including four MGs) set off at 9.00 am for our first day with an overnight stop at Cootamundra. A simple drive directly to Goulburn on the busy Hume Highway led us to the wonderful Roses Café in the township for morning tea. Meeting us there were Sally and Stuart Ratcliff. Having reportedly missed, the Road House turn in at Pheasant Nest due to some sought of distraction! Our next stop was to be lunch at Harden; this was via Crookwell, Rugby and Boorowa.

The sweeping, undulating country driving conditions



were a welcome and pleasing change from the hectic Hume. The road is sealed between Crookwell and Rugby contrary to what may be show on some maps.

After Lunch at the Café/Bakery in Harden some of us made a visit to the large bronze sculpture nearby of "Bill The Bastard". A memorial of the Waler (horse) that carried five soldiers to safety, during the first world war. An easy 40km drive lay ahead of us to

Cootamundra via the Burley Griffen Way and Olympic Highway.

The Olympic Highway, officially named Olympic Way in 1963 was part of the torch relay route, Cowra to Albury for the 1956 Melbourne Games and Wagga to Cowra for the 2000 Sydney Games.

Arriving around 3.00pm at our overnight accommodation, The Heritage Motel in Cootamundra we were met by two more cars. Our tour group now consisted a total of twelve cars, including five MGs, and 19 participants.

The events of the evening and night, unknown to all were yet to unfold.......

We went to dinner at the Golf/Country Club next door to our Motel. A great setting but the kitchen was clearly over whelmed by our numbers. Our quiet and comfortable Motel was to be woken at 1.30 am by the fire alarm ringing in all rooms. A system glitch was identified and for those in the car park in pyjamas, we went back to our rooms.

Cootamundra is the birthplace of Sir Donald Bradman. He is more often associated with the NSW town of Bowral as this was his residence. Cootamundra is also home of the Cootamundra Sprints held annually by the VSCC on the local airfield. I'm told it is a great event.

Day 2 Thurs 2nd May. Cootamundra to Moama 421K

The first topic of conversation during the morning was our earlier Fire Alarm wake up call. Our second overnight stop was Moama on the Murray River. This was via Junee, Coolamon, Nerrandera, Jerilderie and Deniliquin.

With loverly weather again on our side and anticipation of another great day ahead of us we set off 10 minutes ahead of our usually punctual 9.00am start. Unfortunately, and unknowingly at the time one blue MGB-GT was left to exit an empty Motel car park alone. This detail was made clear later on during the day.

There were ideal undulating, winding driving conditions on the way to the historic railway town of Junee. A slight detour due to roadworks on the edge of town and on to Coolamon for a morning tea stop. There was a very dramatic change of scenery and driving conditions shortly after our morning stop. Upon hitting the Newell Highway for our journey south we now encountered dry, open country. Flat, straight driving on one of this states main north/south trucking routes. Jerilderie as history students will recall was the place of the Bushranger, Ned Kelly's Jerilderie Letter, Bank robbery and Hotel siege. Our final sector onto Moama for the night was via Conargo with its famous 1850 pub and onto the Cobb Highway at Deniliquin.

The landscape and driving conditions were much the same as before our lunch stop: flat, dry and straight. Our Moama overnight stop at Cadell on the Murray Resort was a relaxing oasis with a well organised dinner at the nearby Service Club.

Here we got onto B & C roads, several of which were






Touring the Great Ocean Road






